



in a full hall at Glenavy with approximately 120 in attendance.

CSI's Mark Webb provided an on-screen presentation on the history of the salmon runs and the search for options to increase the runs of salmon in the Waitaki River. Phil de Joux from McKinnon's Creek the Hatchery followed with a presentation on the resurrection of the this hatchery and the results achieved to date. A popular proposal is the possibility of refurbishing the salmon rearing raceway at Bells property at Ikiwai last used by the Waitaki Valley Acclimatisation Society. Salmon were reared here with volunteer labour and I recall doing my bit when volunteers needed time off. I'm sure Phil's images of their make-over of the disused facility and of spawning salmon returning to the hatchery last year has provided the "Waitakians" with optimism and enthusiasm to do something similar on the Waitaki River. Successful hatchery operation involves the duplication of spawning fertilisation, hatching and rearing of fish, in this case Chinook salmon, artificially. If you know anybe reasonably uncomplicated or we wouldn't have any fish at all. However, when you're rearing many thousands or even millions of fish, the opportunity for things to go pear-shaped is ever present. I have worked in 4 hatcheries during my years in the fish and game business, Green-Glenariffe park. and Silverstream in the North Canterbury region, and at Ikiwai with the New Haven Company and later Sanford Limited. Five if you count Bells raceway, and with every new hatchery technology has changed, although, the basics remain. There is considerable responsibility in hatchery management, and despite modern techniques, dailv maintenance is necessary and labour intensive. While I have not received a contact address for the newly elected steering committee for the Waitaki salmon enhancement group, for those interested in assisting and missed the meeting, I will have one available for the next report.

I'm off to Norfolk Island next week, and will need to talk nicely to Hamish Stevens to see if he will prepare a fishing report .

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
Spectacular iceberg action creates 'splash' at Aoraki Mount Cook

Passengers aboard two Glacier Explorers boats at Aoraki Mount Cook last weekend were treated to a real show-stopper when the largest iceberg in the Tasman Glacier terminal lake rolled over and split in two right before their eyes.

Dubbed 'Taniwha'. the 400m long by 300m wide by 100m high iceberg calved off the Tasman Glacier last summer and has been sitting high in the lake ever since. However as it slowly melted it became top heavy, causing it to roll and split.

Glacier Explorers Operations Manager Bede Ward, whose company takes visitors on boat trips near the icebergs on the Tasman Glacier terminal lake, says it was an unforgettable experience for both tourists and guides.

"We knew it was likely to happen for about a week prior and extended our





safety zone accordingly, but everyone was just blown away to actually see it - it was absolutely amazing.

"It's hard to comprehend that the iceberg you see above the water is only 10 percent of what's actually underneath the water and to see it rear up in all its glory is phenomenal."

Glacier Explorers' three hour Tasman Glacier terminal lake boat cruises (90 minutes on the lake) are fast becoming a mustdo activity for those who Aoraki visit Mount Cook. Passengers not only get to cruise the icebergs but also receive spectacular views of the surrounding mountains and some of the best photographic opportunities in the Aoraki Mount Cook National Park and World Heritage Area.

Mr Ward says Glacier Explorers has already taken a record numbers of visitors on its cruises this season and believes reports of the two million year old, 27km long Tasman Glacier retreating have been a real drawcard.

"People want to see New

Zealand's longest glacier while they can and Glacier Explorers provides an awesome, up close experience.

"Since the Terminal Lake began forming in the 1970s, the Tasman Glacier's retreat has been increasing at a faster rate and the process of water lapping on the icebergs is exacerbating its retreat. This is leaving an iceberg phenomenon in its wake - to see it is a once in a lifetime experience for most people."

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"Dreams do come true"

Having been unable to ride a bike for 24 years, you might be able to imagine the sheer delight I felt, speeding along at 17km/h towards our local café. Wind in my face, birds chirping away, an orange indicator flag flapping in the breeze; Will and our boys riding along side me (well, they would ride ahead. come back, circle me and speed off again.) No training wheels for me: this bike already has three wheels and instead of foot pedals I use hand power.

Bike riding became my main source of transport while at Teachers College, although my bike riding days came to an abrupt end: I had my car accident and lost my left leg above the knee and clinically destroyed my right knee. Aside from the fact that with only one leg to pedal with, and going in circles was not much fun; I found the suction in my artificial limb could not be maintained on a bike (simply - my leg fell off.) It wasn't until years later when I saw a recumbent bike system in action and thought: 'Why not?'

So began my journey of discovery. I spent time researching the bike options that were available and emailed and spoke with Brian at Trikes NZ. The Kettwiesel trike stood out as most suitable, due to its height off the ground and pedalling action. hand Once I received the quote I approached ACC for assistance in purchasing a Kettwiesel trike. ACC required me to have another occupational therapist assessment. This meant a wait for an appointment, another wait for an answer and then finally the decision: NO. It was decided I was an

'unsuitable recipient', as this bike was a want, not a need, and not something – they felt – was of benefit to my personal life and physical wellbeing.

I was really upset as I knew that cycling on a trike like this was an activity I could actually do without putting extra strain and stress on my already over worked knee. It would also get me out of the house and my car, plus get me around Twizel with my family and friends, (not forgetting building up my fitness level.) There weren't many other options for me in ACC consulted with my prosthesis-tist as to the components of the leg and they suggested my case manager reconsider the application for the hand bike. My next assessment was with a physio, who, happily, understood my physical limitations and the environment in which I lived. I felt more hopeful this time and was thrilled when the answer eventually came back: 'Yes we will support you in purchasing a hand bike. We feel this will be of long term benefit for you'. I was gobsmacked and yet so humbled by their change of



On returning to Twizel, I found my front door was ablaze with balloons and colour, a sign of everyone's delight and anticipation rewarded. My goal to be

more mobile was achieved, now I had to get fit enough to enjoy it all. The following day, my home was inundated with my good friends who came to see and celebrate the success that was. A small hitch with the chain was quickly and kindly sorted: three links removed and I was off and not looking back.

Now you can see me speeding down our road, with a tail wind, and all around Twizel. (Though I'm finding the ride home is much slower: Twizel always seemed quite flat!). It is great getting along and stopping to talk to different people, whereas in the past I would just have waved

as I whipped past in my car.

I now wonder how many coffee stops there are on the Central Otago Rail Trail?

terms of physical activity. Walking more than a short distance had become a challenge for me, and swimming was inaccessible as well as being seasonal.

I realised I just had to accept ACC's decision, and financially the trike wasn't an option for us to buy on our own; but with support from family and many friends, who also felt disappointed, I decided to wait and give it another try in a few months. In the meantime while I was having a new leg built, Wellington heart and belief that I was worthy of the support I had requested. The earlier rebuff not withstanding, I so appreciate the support and assistance ACC have always shown me over the twenty years since my accident.

The bike, duly ordered, arrived in Christchurch just prior to Christmas. My boys and I were off to try it and hopefully bring it home. WOW!!! It was beautiful and better yet - **Canterbury colours**: sadly that fluoro-pink Lycra 'all in one'



Alister - I was bought up, lived & worked in Hydro towns most of my life. First place was The Cobb, family left there 1954 for a new life way down south at Hawea for the Control Weir job. Imagine 6 kids jammed in the back of a 1929 chev truck under a canvas canopy for 2 days on mostly gravel roads. 1958 we moved to Otematata for the construction on the Benmore dam. I left school at Otematata to work on the final clean up at Benmore. On learning a few skills at operating the earthmoving plant I moved down the valley to the Aviemore Dam construction. During those years my interests were hunting & rugby. If you played rugby, part of the deal was that Max Smith insisted every player be in a concrete gang or a steely (for the fitness). On completion of Aviemore I West Armwent to Manapouri for 4 months, a single man in isolation was not for me, so moved to Haast in 1968, at least there was a road in and out of the place, stayed for 2 years on road construction. 1970 was the start of the roading for Twizel to be built, then came the canal earthworks for 3 years. During this time I was playing a bit of Rep rugby for North Otago and, while travelling up and down the valley to Oamaru, I met a bird called Pam Tumaru at the Duntroon pub, of course. She told me she owned a yacht, thought here was a good catch for

a poor construction worker, close, her ancestors had a wakalli

Pam - Born in Christchurch, spent my next 19 yrs in Duntroon, going to school there, then Waitaki Girls High School in Oamaru, every day by bus for 3 yrs. My dad had a sheep shearing run which bought him up this way as far at Tekapo and the Lindis. He always seemed to be away from home a lot. I have one brother.

My first job was a telephonist at the Duntroon Telephone Exchange/Post Office, worked with my Mum, who later became the Post Mistress, then they closed the Post Office. like many of those in little country townships in 1971. It was at this time, that the Otematata football team used to bus down to Oamaru in the weekends. I had a girlfriend who used to work in the telephone exchange in Kurow and who was quite keen on one of these guys (no idea who he was). She would ring me up if I was working and say the bus had passed through Kurow. We used to have a little opening on the door in the exchange, I would hear the bus coming through, have a little sneak look, and then wait for it to return, they would always stop at the Duntroon pub (one of the many stops), see this certain person get out, ring my friend etc.

Not sure what he thought of her, but anyway she went off him and found a farmer at Duntroon and married him. So why has this certain person got so much of my attention? Well, I heard through a friend of a friend, that he was quite keen on me. One night I was on the night shift and there was a call from Otematata (knew who was on up there as well, we all used to have good chats when it was late at night) for 5M (yes we had funny phone no's). Anyway, I put thru the call,

Mum answered the phone, (somehow I was still on the line), it was that certain person, asking for me, Mum told him I was working. To cut a long story short, I started going out with Alister and here I am still, 37 yrs later.

I then worked for lan & Woods at the Aileen Omarama Hotel waitressing, next job, moving to Twizel's staff Hostel, (if only those walls could talk) as telephonist for the MOW for a few months, married Jan 72, first son Darryl made his appearance in May. Moved into a brand new transportable de Geest house in Cass Crescent. As someone else has mentioned in previous articles, dirt and plants arrived with a chit, and you set up your home. Twizel became home to lots of young families, the maternity home doing a roaring trade, good money to be made and cheap rent for Decided to everyone. leave the safety of Twizel, moved to Methven for 1 night, then to Christchurch, lived in a caravan with Alister's sister and family, he tried wood cutting, didn't work out, back to Twizel, this time to Totara Drive, another new house and

Clyde for a couple of years, never home, didn't work out, so back to Twizel again in 1976, just as well the job here lasted for quite some years, this time we had another new house in Braemar Place, same story with the section.

By this time both kids were at school, I got a part time job with the Post Office, which later led to full time. Good times with good people, some of whom are still here, Glenda and Dennis, who still loves working with the ladies, and once again the Govt decided to close us down, I remember there was quite a to do about it. even got on national TV, a sad day for Twizel.

Our kids loved growing up in Twizel, sports, good schooling, good friends, nice safe environment, both did very well in school, both went overseas to Canada & USA for 6 wks, thru the Lions Youth Exchange scheme, which my Dad initiated for them. We moved again, into Pukaki Place and bought that house (very cheap) which, at that time lots of us were able to as the town was going to be staying. In 1986 we were on the move once again, Alister

was made redundant, so

I got a job with ECNZ, lost that one, then still worked out of the same office for various companies and still here working for Meridian Energy, still some of same staff here from ECNZ days.

Darryl finished up in Cromwell as well, he then went to Canada, then London and stayed with Mel, worked for a bit, came home, worked at TC in Wanaka for a few years in winter on the groomer and in the summer working for Doc, now he is permanent up at Mt Cook for DOC. He is definitely an outdoors person, loves being out in the hills, shooting and taking photos, has had a few cover shots on the Rod & Riffle mag.

Mel: Went to Dunedin to Uni for 5 yrs coming out with a degree in Physical Ed & Psychology. The big OE beaconed for 5 yrs, she came back to Sydney, boyfriend in tow. Alister & I did an OE as well, while the kids were in the UK for a month and had a good look round.

4 yrs ago we had another OE experience, we all went to Durban, Sth Africa for the wedding of Mel and Sean, held in a Game Park. What a marvellous trip we all had and now we have lovely in-laws, son-in -law and very soon to be our very first grandchild we can't wait.

In the new year all our family walked the Routeburn Track, which we highly recommend.

Alister is presently working for Downer EDI Works on major projects like roading & sub divisions. Having the experience travelling away with his job, he still can't see anywhere better than Twizel to live, clear air, great lakes, mountains, rivers and great people.

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

Central South Island Fishing Report Graeme Hughes

Another week of foggy starts and warm afternoons but not much wind. With some high flows down to normal. the Rangitata, Ahuriri, and low flows increased , Hakataramea and Maerewhenua, conditions for fishing in most place has improved and is reflected in reports of angler catch rates. The Waitaki catchment is still showing signs of the "big wet" with the Tekapo River receiving 20 cumecs at the spillway and a further 94 at the Pukaki confluence. With these inflows the Tekapo river is still high and the Waitaki River is carryWaitaki river should be down to more angler friendly levels by the first weekend of February. Salmon fishing may be tough going in 500 cumecs however the Rangitata River is fishable at 81 cumecs.

Writing fishing reports can be a hazardous pastime, and because fishing is far from an exact science, any opinions expressed or experiences related by the report writer can be shot full of holes and often is. Case in point: after relating my history on Waitaki lakes at high levels and the difficulty experienced in catching fish a Cantabrian angler, David Barron, whom I have known since before he could swing a rod, comments on my miserable



ing 520 cumecs, further frustrating anglers. Meridian Energy tells me that Tekapo spilling is in regression and should be over by Sunday but the Pukaki spill may last another week. All going to plan and without the arrival of another nor west storm, not forecasted, the valley's lakes and the results when the dams are spilling and lake levels are up. I'm sure he'll not mind if I repeat his comments and use his images which illustrate how there is nothing absolute about fishing. Thanks

Dave, receiving your Email made my day.

"Love getting your weekly reports - Thanks.

Re "Lake levels in the upper valley are still high an although there are a few boats trolling, from my experience I have always found that during times of high levels the fishing is not great. I haven't worked out why this should be. There should be some feeding opportunities in and around flooded shorelines, and although I have commented in previous reports about casting worm baits to trout seeking out insects and worms amongst the tussock. boating and casttowards inundated ina shorelines has not been successful".

I am not sure Emily will agree with your findings, we found the fishing great last weekend (Sunday 17th). Em caught 6 fish (majority released of course) in the space of 2 1/2 hours (approx) with Dad only catching 2. Boy, am I getting sick of being out-fished by an 8 year old.

What was of interest, was apart from 1 of the fish they were all great size. Her biggest being a 5lb fish. The rest ranged from 4 ½ - 3lb. We have never caught so many larger fish, someone suggested that this may be because they had been pushed back from the floods in the Ahuriri - is that a possible reason or do you have another wise suggestion?

If I look at the comparable dates for fishing between this year and last we have approx ½ again more fish so the season has been quite good so far. Dave" Of course I had to supply some sort of explanation and this was the best I could come up with at the time.

:Hi Dave

Thanks for the mail and pics and too bad about being outfished again! I should have been a little clearer with my experience re high lake levels and hard fishing. I was referring to Lake Waitaki which has no river running into it as does Lake Benmore. The fish shown do look like silver river type fish and may well have been ex Ahuriri River. As there has been nothing but flood after flood since early December this could well be a reason. Lake dwelling Rainbow trout are sometimes darker. colour is often a result of habitat, i.e. clean river aravels compared to silt and weed substrate, common sense really, however, sometimes colour will change due to the time of year, i.e. spawning colours. However, there is another reason you can factor in, and that is visibility. Floods have provided coloured water and trout will always hit harder and more often in coloured water. They have not the luxury of gin clear water in which to positively identify that what they are looking at going past (and disappearing into the gloom) is really something good to eat. Grab it now or lose it in the turbid water. Often in clear water you will see fish just follow and observe, that won't happen too often in coloured water. The most likely answer however, is, Emily is just better at it than anyone else. But that's fishing.

Mackenzie Sky in February

In February we are pulling slowly away from neighbouring Mars, as we orbit the Sun more quickly in our inside lane. However, Mars will continue to grace our night sky with its brilliant orange glow for several months, growing more dim and setting earlier and earlier as the year progresses.

At the same time, we are drawing closer to Saturn in its distant orbit, so it will be brightening in our night sky. Rising after 11pm at the beginning of the month, it follows about 2 hours behind Mars and a bit higher in the sky, moving in the north from east to west. It is much dimmer than Mars and has a slightly golden hue.

Very bright Jupiter and Venus will appear close above the horizon after sunset for most of the month. Jupiter will be above Venus until the 17th when Venus will just nudge past it. Do not try to spot them before sunset as they are too close to the Sun and you may damage your eyes. By the 28th Jupiter will have disappeared behind the Sun and will be in conjunction meaning that a line joining Earth and Jupiter will pass directly through the Sun in between.

Dwarf planet Pluto, far too distant and small, about 1/3 the size of our Moon, to be seen with the naked eye, is also out there in our night-time sky, accompanied by its three known moons, Charon, Nix and Hydra. Pluto takes nearly 250 years to complete one orbit around the Sun. At its closest approach to the Sun (perihelion) it is 30 times Earth's distance, and the outer reaches of its orbit carry it to almost 50 times our distance.

If you are a very early riser you may see Mercury in the eastern sky before the rising Sun. Two hours ahead of the Sun at the beginning of the month, it will be catching up to Earth in our orbit, drawing closer and closer to the Sun each day so that it will be very difficult to see by the end of the month.

Here, in our New Zealand time-zone we had two full moons in January, on the 1st and the The next full 30th. moon will not occur until March 1st, so February will begin with a moon just past full and waning, will end with an almost full moon waxing, and, having only 28 days, will have no full moon of its own. The new moon will occur on the Chinese New Year, which is also Valentine's Day, the 14th of February. Hui-tanguru, the 9th month of the Maori calendar year, will begin the following day. Also on the 15th the most distant planet, Neptune, will be in conjunction, on the far side of the Sun from Earth.

Gemini the Twins are low on the northern horizon this month. Viewed upside down from our southern vantage point, the twins are standing on their heads, the two bright stars Castor and Pollux.

We celebrate the births of two great Renais-

sance astronomers this month, the Italian Galileo Galilei in 1564, and Nicolaus Copernicus nearly a century earlier in 1473 in the Kinadom of Poland. Both men were devoted Roman Catholics, but Coperniexpounded cus and Galileo championed the heliocentric (Suncentred) view of the universe, in opposition to the Church's chergeocentric, ished or Earth-centred view. It was Pope John Paul II who centuries later vindicated Galileo and his scientific efforts.
