Common PLC Concepts and Terms

Collaborative Culture:

- <u>PLC Teams:</u> Educators committed to working collaboratively and interdependently to improve student achievement.
- <u>Collaboration:</u> A systematic process in which people work together, interdependently, to analyze and impact professional practice in order to improve student achievement, for which members are held mutually accountable.
- <u>Team Norms:</u> Guidelines developed by team members to increase team productivity and effectiveness, ensure all members have opportunity to contribute and keep dialogue open and respectful.
- <u>Team Roles:</u> Roles assigned to team members to share the workload fairly and equitably and to ensure that PLC meetings are productive and effective.

Focus on Learning:

• Critical Questions:

- o What knowledge and skills do we expect our students to learn?
- o How will we know if our students have learned expected outcomes?
- o How will we respond, individually and collectively, when our students have difficulty learning expected outcomes?
- o How will we respond, individually and collectively, when our students have already learned expected outcomes?
- o How can we use the evidence of student learning to inform and improve our practice?
- **Power Standards:** The knowledge and skills that are essential in preparing students for the final examination.
- <u>SMART Goals:</u> Goals that are <u>Specific</u>, <u>Measurable</u>, <u>Attainable</u>, <u>Results-oriented</u>, and <u>Timebound</u>.
- **Systematic Intervention:** A well planned Lesson Study with innovations to ensure that every student will learn especially in acquiring essential knowledge and skills.

Focus on Results:

- **Formative Assessment:** An assessment is formative when all of the following occur:
 - o The assessment is used to identify students who are experiencing difficulty
 - o Those students are provided additional time and support to acquire the skill
 - o The students are given another opportunity to demonstrate their learning
- <u>Summative Assessment:</u> Assessments designed to provide a final measure (proficient/not proficient).
- <u>Common Assessment:</u> Student learning will be assessed using the same instrument or process and according to the same criteria.
